## Cub Scout Resident Camp HOW IT WORKS

If your son is currently a Tiger or Wolf Cub, then Cub Resident Camp is the age-appropriate summer camp experience designed for your son to enjoy.

Cub Resident Camp sessions are three days and two nights in length and parents are welcome and encouraged to attend camp with their son.

While earning various advancements should not be the only goal for boys at summer camp, Cub Resident Camp participants will complete requirements that will qualify them for rank advancement. Leaders will be given a form to assist in tracking their boys' advancement.

Cub Scouts will travel in groups to the various program areas. The camp staff provides the entire program throughout the day. Leaders and parents are asked to maintain discipline within the group and are always welcome to help in program sessions if they are so inclined. Some of the projects you work on may take more than one day to complete.

Each boy learns a tremendous amount about both Scouting and himself in the pristine setting of Tuckahoe's woodlands. Our top-notch staff ensures that there is never a moment without activity during a boy's stay at camp.

**Free Adult Leaders:** If a pack brings at least 8 Scouts to summer camp, the first two adults are free. Then for each additional 8 Scouts, one additional adult is free. Adult Fee- \$55



## PARENTS FAMILY NIGHT AT CUB RESIDENT CAMP

Spend an evening at summer camp with your son and see all the things he's been doing during his stay at camp. The final evening during all Cub Resident Camp sessions is family night. Visitors can see a colorful flag ceremony, have dinner at camp, tour the camp's program areas and enjoy the closing campfire show.

All Cub Scouts, their friends, and families are invited to attend the family night BBQ and closing campfire program. Families should sign up through their son's unit for the meal. The chicken barbecue is served just after 6:15 p.m. The cost is \$7 per guest over age 12, \$5 for children ages 7 to 11, and children age 6 and under eat free.

All barbecue reservations must be paid in advance. When parents arrive at camp, please sign in at the camp office. Families should arrive at camp by 5 p.m. for evening programs.

## CUB RESIDENT MEDICAL FORMS

In order to attend any of the Cub Resident Camp sessions, all campers (both boys and adults) must do the following:

Complete an annual health and medical record and bring it with them to camp with a copy of your insurance card

**NOTE:** FOR CUB SCOUT RESIDENT CAMP - A PHYSICAL EXAM BY A PHYSICIAN IS NOT REQUIRED TO ATTEND CUB SCOUT RESIDENT CAMP.

**WHAT TO BRING TO CUB CAMP**

When packing for camp, it's wise to remember the Boy Scout Motto: Be Prepared! An extra set of clothes will make a world of difference to a camper who gets caught in the rain, for example. On the other hand, try to avoid the temptation to bring too much. Ideally, you should be able to carry everything you need for your visit in a small duffle-bag or footlocker. Remember that vehicular transportation into your campsite will be limited, so plan now to pack smartly and avoid future aggravations.
